

COMING HOME



Returning to Canada and leaving my second home in Rwanda reminds me to think about what it is that I am bringing home with me.

Our Embrace Rwanda team had a very successful trip and the outcomes are really more than we had even expected. God is working powerfully in the Diocese of Kigeme and we can see the positive changes in the health of the community, especially in the Healthy Mums Project. Our brothers and sisters there are working so hard to move toward sustainability and it was such a blessing to see the fruits of their labour.

I will hold a session soon to give an update on all our project work in Kigeme but I wanted to share now how the spiritual blessing I bring home is one that can have far reaching effects both in Rwanda and Canada.

At the end of our trip I attended the Evangelical Convention in the neighbouring Diocese of Butare under the leadership of Bishop Nathan. The theme "I will give you a new heart", Ezekiel 36:26.

For me an international convention like this affirms that we are indeed "all one in Christ" and the convention was tangible evidence of this.

I came from Canada not really knowing what to expect. I had attended the convention last year in Musanze, Rwanda and knew that this year would be different. We were aware of the challenges to organize the convention, the lack of finances etc., the skepticism that was present and yet God took over and surprised us all.

I believe this was due to the obedience of Bishop Nathan who heard God's call and was convicted in his heart to be used by God to: as Nathan put it: "to establish eternity in Butare peoples' hearts".

Florence, Nathan's wife, told us how the Lord taught them to be strong. They had asked Him to move mountains and despite no money and discouraging spirits they asked the Lord to stand by Nathan to show that they believe in a God who is real. The people in Butare thought they were crazy to plan the convention and yet it is not about us but about God doing great things. God showed up and there were thousands who came and were blessed.

What a privilege to see God use this faithful man and his wife Florence as instruments of His work. Yes. I think we were all "flabbergasted", Nathan's word, as we saw the weekend unfold, the resources provided, the international participation, the souls that were touched by the Holy Spirit and old hearts made new.

Mine too! I was strengthened spiritually to see God in action in His faithful servants. Oh, how I now long to have a new heart that says, "Yes, I will obey your call Lord, despite the obstacles."


I give God the glory for what he did in the hearts of the people in Butare and pray that I might bring back that joy to Canada, believing that he can indeed change hearts here too.

HOME COMING



One of the most famous homecomings is recorded in Luke 15. A father welcomes home his son from a time of wasteful and hard living. For some time before the boy found his way from the pigsty to the road outside his father's estate, the father had been daily coming out on the road looking off into the distance to see if his son was approaching. His heart longed for close and personal relationship regardless of his son's history.

During the summer lots of folks find time to party. I make less copies of the study sheet for participants in the Thursday evening meeting in Mission Possible. We need less chairs. I know we need to wait until the end of the summer for people to wander back and consider what God's claims on their lives might look like. This year I was a bit surprised, but nevertheless, very pleased that this homecoming began a few weeks early. By mid-August friends were coming through the door we hadn't seen in months. Some came from the East Coast and others from Central Canada and various centers around the Lower Mainland and British Columbia. My heart always leaps within me to see that friends are alive, that they have overcome guilt and shame and decided to give God another opportunity to speak into their lives. It's great to have them all home again. They have a place at the table and a place in our hearts.

I stood in front of a couple of dozen women tonight in a drug and alcohol recovery center sharing the good news that Jesus awaits an invitation just like the one He got from Jairus in Mark 10. We all have issues of need and Jesus stands ready to do for us what we cannot do for ourselves. All Jesus needs is an invitation to be brought to our homes, to our hearts, to the areas of need in our lives. When Jesus came to Jairus' home and the impossible situation that awaited him there, he made a life changing

difference for the family. When women responded tonight by coming forward for prayer they invited Jesus to come into their lives and make Himself at home in new areas of their history and their hopes. Jesus wants to come and be at home with us. Will we welcome Him or keep him waiting at a distance?

Last week I sat in a North Vancouver court room as a mother wept about the fact that she wouldn't soon be going home to her children. Her sentence was longer than she had anticipated for the crime to which she was pleading guilty. The shame and embarrassment she feels is fueling a growing realization that she cannot responsibly drink alcohol. As I continue to meet with her now inside prison walls I pray that she will give God a chance to make her heart and life safe in His love so her abusive use of alcohol will not damage her home life any further.

Partners in Hope seeks to accompany these and many other individuals like them. We remind them that God is calling them home to His heart and to reconciliation with family members so they can truly go home and live the fullness of love and relationship for which they were created. We appreciate your prayerful support as we speak and pray and encourage friends to come home to these loving relationships God is making available to them.

ON THE HOME-STRETCH

The theme of *homecoming* is an interesting one for me as I have been recently reflecting on my lack of *home* in this world. Since returning to Burkina Faso in January, I have led a rather nomadic existence, not wandering aimlessly, but moving from one oasis to another – Vancouver, Ouagadougou, Syn, Ouagadougou, Vancouver, Ouagadougou, Syn.... A good friend remarked that *pilgrim* would be a better metaphor and, in the sense that *nomad* implies a lack of purpose. She is undoubtedly correct, especially as we are all pilgrims on earth journeying towards our true home with the Father. However, there is still something in the image of desert nomads, who regularly move from oasis to oasis, that strikes a chord with me.



This past month, we have seen God move in miraculous ways in the midst of computer problems. Both of the team's *new* computers stopped functioning. Incredibly, both of the *old* computers (actually, quite ancient in computer life-years) continue to work with only minor inconveniences and no data was lost. In response to prayer requests sent out, the Lord has provided for two new computers. While we await their arrival, the computer tech in Ouaga was able to resurrect one of the two dead computers and it is now back *home* in the village and working hard. God is so good!



Another word related to coming home is *home-stretch* – that last lap before the finish line. We are definitely on the *home-stretch* now. Emmanuel, Simon and I are working through the New Testament text, checking for errors in spelling, punctuation, formatting, etc. There will no doubt be errors we miss but we will try to eliminate as many as possible. (I've heard of far too many stories of translators opening up the newly published New Testament only to immediately see an overlooked error to think that we will be exempt!) On September 14th, the text will be run through various computer checks to verify our work and then we will be cleared to leave for Cameroon to typeset the New Testament. We will fly from Ouagadougou to Yaoundé on September 30th and will begin working with the typesetting team there on October 3rd. That process is expected to take about 6 weeks and then the final layout will be sent to South Korea for printing. Sometime next year, the finished product will arrive back in Burkina Faso and then, finally, we will party!



Please continue to pray for Emmanuel, Simon and I as we travel the *home-stretch* – that the Lord would keep us in good health and protect both us and our equipment. I never cease to thank our Lord for your partnership in this incredible journey.

A TIME TO RECRUIT



I'm off to England in just over a week to do some "recruiting" for the network I'm a part of there. The Unreached People Group (UPG) which I'm focused on, as well as related UPG's in the same region, the network is made up of individuals, churches and organizations. As a network our purpose is: to generate prayer for the UPG's in this region and for the field workers among them; to bring awareness of, and advocate for, these UPG's in the British Church; to offer various types of resources ; to offer training and learning opportunities related to our focus area; and to facilitate both senders, and field workers and their work. For each of us in the network, our ultimate desire is to reach the UPG's of this region with the Good News, and to see the Kingdom established there. Through collaboration we feel the giftings of the whole Body can be utilized, and synergy can happen.

Because of the sensitive nature of work in this region, our network is very relationship based and we don't have any sort of web presence. People and churches find out about us by word of mouth, or we hear about them from those we know. Either way the next step is a phone or Skype call, both to get a sense of the people, their ministry and/or needs, and as a very low key security check. If that goes well, and it usually does, a face-to-face meeting is arranged. There is nothing like a face-to-face meeting to build relationship as well as to connect in with the network. My upcoming trip involves a number of these face-to-face meetings, mostly people we are approaching rather than the other way around.

Later this autumn we will be having our first network gathering in almost 2 years, the Lord having asked us to have a "fallow" period for a season. As the main point person for the network, I have stayed connected with a core group throughout this time, including visits with all of them last summer. Now it is time to start the gatherings again, and to expand the network. Would you please pray both for my upcoming "recruiting" trip, and for the network gathering in October? It is a new season for this network focused on a strategic group of related Unreached People Groups, and Aslan is on the move among them.

COMING HOME

Coming home! It has a warm and pleasant sound, doesn't it? It usually creates a degree of excitement and anticipation. It did for me when I returned to The Gambia after being away for 7 years. I was not disappointed, but was certainly in for some surprises! The church I had attended here for a little over 24 years had changed so much I hardly knew anyone, and the pastor was new as well. It has not been easy to track down the students I taught at the Omega Training Institute – a secretarial skills training centre. About half of them are now overseas in America or Europe. It has been exciting to reconnect with a few of them and also with the teachers who worked with me. About half of the WEC team I worked with is still here. Meeting them again was like finding long lost sisters and brothers even though I had kept in touch with them in the field. I'm finding that when we share a history, especially of struggles in faith and ministry, it deepens relationships and responses. Home is where the heart is. We will traverse borders and bridges to connect and reconnect.



I can only imagine what deep emotions the prodigal son of Luke 15 and his family must have experienced when he returned home. What impresses me most about this story is the unconditional love he was given by his father whose love he had spurned, dishonored and rejected for a totally selfish, wayward and destructive lifestyle. Coming home to the Father is like this for me. It is not difficult to put myself in the shoes of the prodigal. After the insecurity of my childhood and the instability of my early adult life, finding the open arms of my Heavenly Father as the Light at the end of the proverbial tunnel reveals what true *Coming Home* is. It has little to do with geographical location and everything to do with unconditional love. It has everything to do with the sacrificial love of the Father that forgives the vilest sinner and welcomes him or her home. It is relationship at its deepest level. This is the lesson I have been learning and want to share with those who are struggling to find their true Home.
